Bonding over Batches- This is an informal system where the students of same roll no. are BOB to the 1st year student. This system helps in encouraging conversation across batches and also helps the freshers with other problems the student would be facing irrespective of it being academic or non academic Teaching Assistant-Each subject has a minimum of 2 teaching assistants. These teaching assistants are appointed by the subject teacher and they help in all academic related issues related to the subject they are assistant of. Teaching

Assistants are 4-5th year students. Moot Mentor- Each student who had signed up for open selection, was allotted a moot mentor who would guide them through on how research for a memorial has to be done. The students who would be mentor were 4th and 5th students experienced in mooting. Student Academic Assistance Programme (SAAP)- Students from the senior batches (4-5th Year) can opt to be a SAAP to help students in junior batches in understanding difficult subjects by way of remedial classes and discussion sessions. APPSC project mentor- APPSC is a student organisation, and they allotted seniors to guide the 1st years in their project submission. Projects in law school are very different than the ones which the students have been doing until law school. The students also need constant help to find material from legal databases.

Internet/Computer Centre, Digital Classrooms with E-station, Auditorium, Seminar Rooms, Y. K. Sabharwal Moot Court Hall, Halls of Residence, Transport, Medical Centre and Ambulance (A medical room with a nurse, along with a visiting Doctor every day), Banking, Sports/Games/Fitness, Cafeteria and Mess (a student driven mess, separately for both boys and girls), Printing, Counselling Psychologist (University regularly hires a professionally trained psychologist for counselling, advising, and guiding students on various issues, personal, academic, or professional). The university has constituted various student bodies and student-run committees by which they govern their daily academic and personal life at the university. These each have 9-10 members, two from each batch, representing a wide span of different issues and concerns. Through these committees they look into various matters spanning Academics Legal Aid Moot Court Cultural and Dramatics Literary, Debating, and Quiz Sports Library Student Welfare Mess Hostel Welfare Social Inclusion ADR and Disciplinary. Being a fully residential University, all the students are required to stay in the University's Halls of Residence, which are separate for girls and boys. The collegium of Resident Wardens is directly responsible for its administration. Various support services for students have been created to aid them with their grievances, which are managed by the experienced faculty and experts' councils like: Anti-Ragging issues are taken care of by the authorities. Internal Complaints Committee deals with sexual harassment complaints whose members include faculty, employees, and students. An Advisory Committee of the Equal Opportunity Cell has been constituted so that all students can benefit from a wide range of opportunities. A Dispute Redressal Committee has been constituted which redresses disputes that may arise between the management and staff, management and students, teachers and students, and teachers and management or disputes related to complaints of sexual harassment. Various committees and administration work towards facilitating comfort and ease of normality for the specially-abled students. The University follows a strict adherence for providing the entire milieu to be equal for all, which includes the infrastructure and facilities to be friendly, accessible, and sensitised towards individuals with any disabilities or special needs. Students have formed groups with the aid of faculty advisors which target varied socially relevant issues pertaining to their needs or their contributions to the society like the: IDIA (which makes learning accessible to various ecosocio strata and involves mentoring to potential law aspirants), Gender Circle (engages in issues and discussions of gender parity, equality and justice), Cinema Club (shows movies discussing contemporary issues), Engage (delves into various socio, economic, politico, and cultural issues pertaining to students and life), Enable (makes life accessible to people with disabilities), Ambedkar Periyar Phule Study Circle (extends support to students from marginalised communities), Queer Collective (deals with LGBTQIA issues and debates), RCC (deals with the process of graduating students recruitment coordination), Student Welfare (handles general and all spanning concerns and welfare of students).

Thereby, creating a holistic and socially conducive atmosphere for the growth of healthy inter-personal relations among students from the marginalized sections and from various social backgrounds. This is to help them in developing cordial inter-personal relationships between teachers and the students for academic interaction and extra-curricular activities. It aims to extend help/ support to the students from marginalized sections to overcome problems and barriers emanating from discrimination at any level within its mandate. The Composition comprises of both Teachers and Students. ICC- To hear and address complaints regarding sexual harassment at NLUD, and spreading awareness about gender-related issues and functioning of the ICC. The composition comprises of both Teachers and Students. Disciplinary Committee-The Disciplinary Committee comprises of Hostel Wardens who are de-facto the Professors in our University and Student Convenors of 5th year of various Committees. The purpose of the committee is to stop the nuisance, indiscipline behaviour and to regulate the behavior of students in the campus. The Cooperative Mess in the University is student run and has a Faculty Advisor with respect to clearance of mess bills and the Hostel is managed by a committee of students called the Hostel Welfare Committee. The Student Bar Council is a Composition or Cluster of 14 Committees and each committee has its own Faculty Advisor who from time-to-time intervene in the matters where necessary.

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7.1.7 – Initiatives taken by the institution to make the campus eco-friendly (at least five)

The University flaunts its sprawling campus, situated at Dwarka, New Delhi, with a contemporary and yet eco-friendly infrastructure and green ambiance. The stand out features is its expansiveness and greenery at every nook and cranny. 1. The University is equipped with both modern technologies and environmental friendly practices. It is fully air-conditioned and yet the campus is pollution free and follows a clean and green eco-friendly outlook. With its clean surroundings and green atmosphere, there is a maximum coverage with greenery having over 10,000 potted plants. Upkeep of plantation, potted plants, and overall maintenance is done on a daily basis. 2. Dedicated and designated staff and resources have been assigned to duties related to different types and areas of cleanliness, which is available 24x7, courtesy of the campus being residential. Due to which regular sanitation and fumigation of washrooms, kitchens, classrooms, etc. is done with regularity. Pest control and antimosquito fogging is done every fortnightly to maintain the university insectfree. 3. Everyone at the university is sensitized to environment-friendly behavior, and the management has installed various eco-friendly preservation and conservation machinery and mechanisms. Solar power is used in the hostels to supply hot water to students during winters. The infrastructure is carefully curated by stationing plants, buildings, and pathways that push any excess rainwater away from the walking passage. Running water is available 24x7 on campus, while three rainwater harvesting systems are also in place to save water. 40 water purifiers and coolers are available at every point of the university for providing clean drinkable water. 4. Mess kitchens are equipped with modern technology and advancements in gastronomy, appropriate to ensure health of students. Hairnets and gloves are used for optimum sanitation and prevention of infections. Semi-automated kitchens are installed in boys' and girls' mess wherein hygiene is of utmost importance. 5. All across the campus garbage disposal bins are installed differentiating between dry and wet waste disposal. Garbage disposal is of special concern and solid waste collection and disposal has been assigned on a daily basis to the housekeeping staff and to the SDMC. 6. We believe in equal accessibility and comfort to all, hence there are separate washrooms for the physically challenged. Constant monitoring of the campus is done according to seasonal changes and requirements. 7.

Biodiversity is noticeable in the campus, with birds, butterflies, and stray dogs adopted by the university. 8. There are separate designated places for cocurricular activities, away from the residential and academic buildings, to maintain the peace and equilibrium of the campus. 9. NLU Delhi has adopted five nearby villages (Pochanpur, Kakrola, Amhari, Bagdola, Matiala). Our students visit three villages and provide pro-bono services through its legal aid.

7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Title of Best Practice: Vision for Digital Initiatives The primary objective of National Law University Delhi is to evolve and impart comprehensive and interdisciplinary legal education that is socially relevant. The University intends to impart knowledge to the community through various initiatives, especially through the avenue of digital and e-learning initiatives. Through this type of education, we aim to promote legal and ethical values and foster the rule of law and the objectives enshrined in the Constitution of India. The University works towards dissemination of legal knowledge for national development, so that the ability to analyse and present contemporary issues of public concern and their legal implications for the benefit of the public is improved. These processes strive to promote legal awareness in the community and to achieve political, social and economic justice. Creation and sharing of legal knowledge through the virtual space provides wider opportunities to promote inclusive approach and grass root level awareness. Our sincere endeavour is to make legal education as an instrument of social, political and economic change. We strongly believe that to create awareness about rights and entitlements and to eliminate oppression, exploitation of the weaker, marginalized and poorer sections of the society, and reaching out to communities using new technology would be an appropriate strategy. We have already started moving in this direction. The online landscape would also provide unprecedented/non-traditional avenues for faculty members to imagine new ways to disseminate their teaching and share it with the world. NLUD endeavours: (a) To evolve and impart comprehensive legal education through digital and distant mode to reach out to public at large. (b) To evolve and impart comprehensive legal education including distance learning and continuing legal education at all levels to achieve excellence where technology can be a real game changer. (c) In the undergraduate curricula, the diverse range of academic research conducted at the university will serve as a foundation to cultivate people who can acquire both fundamental as well as cutting-edge specialized knowledge, equip themselves with expert capabilities, develop the ability to conduct original research, and be successful internationally. (d) To organize advanced studies and promote research in law by offering e-courses on various branches of law. (e) To disseminate legal knowledge and legal processes and their role in national development by organizing lectures, seminars, symposia, workshops and conferences through e-platforms. (f) Experiment with new pedagogy that can improve teaching and learning for students at NLUD as well as new students who will be admitted to online educational programmes. (g) To improve the ability to analyse and present for the benefit of the public contemporary issues of public concern and their legal implications through ediscussion platforms. (h) To liaise with institutions of higher learning and research and promote sharing of knowledge and information. (i) To hold examinations and confer degrees and other academic distinctions. (j) To promote legal awareness in the community for achieving social and economic justice. (k) To promote cultural, legal and ethical values with a view to promote and foster the rule of law and the objectives enshrined in the Constitution of India as guiding goals of this initiative, and (1) Continue to amplify the impact of NLUD teaching beyond the campus. Strategy The strategy to achieve the objectives/goals mentioned above will include the following: (a) Use technology

effectively to support the learning process (b) Develop technology blended learning approaches (c) Encourage innovative approaches to curriculum development (d) Training sessions for staff and regular evaluation of resources. Three Year Action Plan I) Increase in efficiency of class room teaching: For achieving such efficiency, following are included in the action plan: (a) Increasing the awareness and understanding of E-Learning as well as building ICT competencies at the University. (b) Availability of Digital Teaching Equipment and Teaching resources on campus to enable academic staff to produce video recordings. (c) Faculty development programme for training of faculty members. (d) Development, review and evaluation of the teaching resources. II) Development of E- Learning Courses: (a) High quality video lecture recordings drawing on multiple technologies to be produced. (b) Development of foundation courses at the initial phase. (c) New courses to be developed in inter-disciplinary area useful for business entities and citizens. (d) Publicizing the courses on different MHRD platforms. (e) Identification of beneficiaries and the target group. III) Conduct and delivery of E- Learning courses: (a) Team to be constituted for help in delivery of course. (b) Creation of user support system. (c) Examination department for certification required. IV) Review of courses and their conduct for further Innovation in Higher learning. 7-year strategic plan (a) Widening of course structures at different levels graduate, post graduate and at certificate/diploma levels. (b) Increase in the number of beneficiaries of the courses. (c) Use of emerging technologies for dissemination of knowledge through courses. (d) Development and introduction of supervision and control functions. (e) Guidance and equipping user support centres with latest technology and development of a methodology for the user relations system which will serve as a unique support system for e-service users. (f) Development of an exclusive mobile app of the e-Learning Centre of the University which would facilitate flexible learning and broad dissemination of information. 15- year vision is: (a) Development of comparative legal courses of international quality. (b) Internationalization of courses: International students should be encouraged to be part of student community and reorganizing schedule of credits, curriculum and duration of the courses. (c) Development of Digital platform for facilitating multiple experts involving in the lecture from different parts of the world. (d) Alliance with world organisations and e-learning teaching institutions: It would increase international visibility and sharing of technology and resources need to be encouraged. 2. Title of Best Practices: Legal Service Committee: over the years, the Legal Services Committee has been involved in fostering legal aid and awareness. While previously our focus was on spreading awareness about rights and facilitating access to courts, from this year the Committee has expanded its domain to also ensure access to government institutions. We believe that given the socio-economic nature of various issues, the remedy must involve interaction with the wider government machinery, with the legal system an essential part of this. We feel that it is our responsibility to have such an objective given the resources and legal expertise available at the disposal of the Legal Services Committee. PROJECT ON COMPENSATION FOR SEWERAGE DEATHS: This Project, being undertaken by the Legal Services Committee in association with the Safai Karamchari Andolan (SKA), aims to identify the families of deceased sewerage workers and to help them claim compensation from the Government of NCT of Delhi. According to the Supreme Court judgment in Safai Karamchari Andolan v. Union of India (2014) 11 SCC 224 in March 2014, the families of persons who have died while cleaning sewers/septic tanks since 1993 are entitled to a compensation of Rs. 10 lakhs from the state government or union territory. While it has been more than two years since the SC judgment was pronounced, as per information received by the Committee through RTI, there seems to be no government department which has initiated the process of identifying such families and providing compensation to them. Through this Project, we are trying to trace as many families as possible of sewerage

workers who have died while being engaged in such forms of manual scavenging in Delhi. We are also helping the families in procuring relevant documents (such as death certificate, post-mortem report, FIR, etc.) from the concerned authorities and in approaching the state government for claiming compensation. The Project has already obtained information about families of more than 50 deceased sewerage workers through visits to Harijan Bastis, police stations and courts across Delhi with the help of committee members and volunteers across batches of the University. LEGAL AID CLINIC Continuing from its operation through the previous year, the Committee re-activated the Legal Aid Clinic to ensure it is fully functional. The Clinic has a separate office space where a legal aid lawyer from the South-West District Legal Services Authority visits the Clinic every week to deal with various grievances addressed to the Clinic. Also, the Clinic now has a dedicated phone number, enabling easier access to persons both within and outside the University. The Committee ensured that awareness drives (through posters and conversations) for the Clinic were not just for areas in and around Dwarka but as much for the staff and other members of the University. Members of the Committee coordinate with the clients and facilitate their access to the lawyer. Each case is recorded and the Committee follows up on the status of the legal issues, providing assistance where it is necessary by way of filing of FIRs, RTIs, contacting officials, accompanying clients, etc. Anyone in need of free legal counsel can reach us at - 91 9560024612. PRO BONO WEEK: The Committee, in collaboration with i-Probono, organized a first-of-its-kind event from 19-23 February 2017 - 'Pro Bono Week'. The event introduced law students with challenges associated with legal work.

We are planning to hold the ASLI Conference 2020 (Asia Law Institute) to bring together scholars of Asia to interact and share ideas for research. Increasing Access to International Scholarship is an initiative taken by the University for bright students through exchange Prog. Since we are the part of Swacch Bharat programme holding 3rd Rank all over India, we'll also adopt community outreach programme and Legal Aid Camps as a social responsibility of ours with the help of the students. Since the University is residential and we have students who are also from the speciallyabled category, in order to aid them, we are in the process of making this campus more Disabled Friendly. To deal with Gender and Sexual Harassments issues the ICC of our College will organise more Gender Sensitization Workshops for all the student batches and also from time to time sensitize to prevent the menace of Ragging in our campus in order to ensure that the new students and also others feel safe and can participate in college events. Further, we will strengthen the mechanism for grievance redressal and promote safe campus space for students irrespective of gender. The Alumni is known as the backbone and prestige of any college, since the inception of the university it has felt to engage more and more with the alumni who can shape and help create vision for students. We are planning to structure the multipurpose court area for playing more sports and procurement of gym equipments and a trainer who can guide the students, and make them fit and healthy is underway. The Student Bar Council is also making efforts to open the library 24x7 in the Campus. The Student Committees has decided to hold different fests on various themes. The University Administration has decided to plant more trees and increase the greenery around the Campus premises and also planned to build more accomodations for students.
