The same is intended to capture their overall experience including course content, method of delivery, course materials, manner of conducting the class, examination, evaluation, accessibility of instructors, their encouragement to critical reflections, etc. This has been in place for a number of years. Currently the University is in the process of revisiting the same in order to widen it further. Over the years the feedback had been collated and shared with the teachers intermittently. The university has a system of sharing attendance and examination results regularly with the parents of students through registered emails. The attendance section and the examination department informs parents if students have to undertake repeat or improvement examinations. Physical meetings are held for this purpose by the

(maximum 500 words) Bonding over Batches- This is an informal system where the students of same roll no. are BOB to the 1st year student. This system helps in encouraging conversation across batches and also helps the fresher with other problems that a student would be/could be facing irrespective of it being academic or non- academic. Teaching Assistant- Each subject has a minimum of 2 teaching assistants. These teaching assistants are appointed by the subject teacher and they help in all academic related issues related to the subject they are the assistant of. Teaching Assistants can only be the 4th-5thyear students. Moot Mentor- Each student who had signed up for open selection, was allotted a moot mentor who would guide them through, on how research for a memorial has to be done. The students who would be mentor can only be 4thand 5thstudents, who are experienced in mooting. Student Academic Assistance Programme (SAAP)- Students from the senior batches (4th-5thYear) can opt to be a SAAP to help students in junior batches to make them understand the difficult subjects by way of remedial classes and discussion sessions. APPSC project mentor- APPSC is a student organisation which allot senior students as mentors to guide the 1st year students in their project submissions. Projects in law schools are very different than the ones which the students used to do in their schools or pre-graduate degrees. The students are provided the constant help and assistance to find material from various legal databases required for projects writing. Remedial Classes- Remedial classes are organised by the university specially for providing assistance to students in subjects where it is felt that students are unable to cope up with the syllabus and need extra support of the teacher. 4.4.2 – Procedures and policies for maintaining and utilizing physical, academic and support facilities - laboratory, library, sports complex, computers, classrooms etc. (maximum 500 words) (information to be available in institutional Website, provide link)

The university has its various facilities overseen collectively by the administration, faculty, student, house keeping and committees. These look at Internet/Computer Centre, Digital Classrooms with E-station, Auditorium, Seminar Rooms, Y. K. Sabharwal Moot Court Hall, Halls of Residence, Transport, Medical Centre and Ambulance (A medical room with a nurse, along with a visiting Doctor every day), Banking, Sports/Games/Fitness, Cafeteria and Mess (a student driven mess, separately for both boys and girls), Printing, Counselling Psychologist (University regularly hires a professionally trained psychologist for counselling, advising, and guiding students on various issues, personal, academic, or professional). The university has constituted various student bodies and student-run committees by which they govern their daily academic and personal life at the university. These each have 9-10 members, two from each batch, representing a wide span of different issues and concerns. Through these committees they look into various matters spanning Academics Legal Aid Moot Court Cultural and Dramatics Literary, Debating, and Quiz Sports Library Student Welfare Mess Hostel Welfare Social Inclusion ADR and Disciplinary. Being a fully residential University, all the students are required to stay in the University's Halls of Residence, which are separate for girls and boys. The collegium of Resident Wardens is directly responsible for its administration. Various support services for students have been created to aid them with their grievances, which are managed by the experienced faculty and experts' councils like: Anti-Ragging issues are taken care of by the authorities. Internal Complaints Committee deals with sexual harassment complaints whose members include faculty, employees, and students. An Advisory Committee of the Equal Opportunity Cell has been constituted so that all students can benefit from a wide range of opportunities. A Dispute Redressal Committee has been constituted which redresses disputes that may arise between the management and staff, management and students, teachers and students, and teachers and management or disputes related to complaints of sexual harassment. Various committees and administration work towards facilitating comfort and ease of normality for the specially-abed students. The University follows a strict adherence for providing the entire milieu to be equal for all, which includes the infrastructure and facilities to be friendly, accessible, and sensitize towards individuals with any disabilities or special needs. Students have formed groups with the aid of faculty advisors which target varied socially relevant issues pertaining to their needs or their contributions to the society like the: IDIA (which makes learning accessible to various ecosocio strata and involves mentoring to potential law aspirants), Gender Circle (engages in issues and discussions of gender parity, equality and justice), Cinema Club (shows movies discussing contemporary issues), Engage (delves into various socio, economic, politico, and cultural issues pertaining to students and life), Enable (makes life accessible to people with disabilities), Ambedkar Periyar Phule Study Circle (extends support to students from marginalised communities), Queer Collective (deals with LGBTQIA issues and debates), RCC (deals with the process of graduating students recruitment coordination), Student Welfare (handles general and all spanning concerns and welfare of students.

National Law University has adopted a cooperative and inclusive model of governance, enabling involvement of various stakeholders in both the overall and day-to-day functioning of the University. 1. University Committees -Involvement in the decision-making process of various stakeholders is achieved through numerous committees, including the student committees. These committees deal with a range of concerns both curricular and co-curricular activities such as cultural activities, sports, etc. Additionally, committees focusing on social justice issues (such as Legal Aid Cell) receive additional support from the University. All committees have been granted substantial discretion in determining initiatives and activities they can undertake. During the Covid pandemic lockdown, various Faculty-Student committees, including the Monitoring Committee, were constituted to ensure smooth functioning of online classes and prompt redressal of any concerns or grievances that arose in that regard. These committees served as a conduit for flow of important information between the University administration, faculty and students. 2. Establishment of the Enabling Unit - the purpose of the Enabling Unit is to make life at the University more accessible for students with disabilities by working toward removing barriers that impede growth and development. The functions of Enabling Unit include: (a) facilitating the admission of persons with disabilities in the university (b) providing guidance to persons with disabilities in the university and (c) creating awareness about the needs of disabled persons, and about other general issues concerning disability. The noted initiatives are among the many that National Law University has undertaken over the years. These initiatives both secure an access to the University authorities and ensures voicing of opinions of various stakeholders, which in turn facilitates a more meaningful deliberation on relevant concerns. Such an approach has enabled a culture of participative management by securing involvement of faculty, non-teaching staff, and students in various aspects of decision-making process in the University

NLUD adopted the online open book examination system in view of the COVID 19 pandemic lockdown. Examination schedule and instructions were circulated through email to all the faculty and students. Similarly, examination duty schedule was notified through email among the faculty members. All questions papers were circulated electronically and students were required to submit their responses through the Turnitin platform, which provided a check against plagiarism. Internal assessment schedule and records were also intimated to the faculty electronically. Information relating to attendance and internal assessment records were electronically communicated to all students and their parents and also made on the TCSiON platform. To assist in examination preparation, all previous years questions papers were digitised and made available on the University Website.

There is an informal parent teacher association which provides various opportunities provided for parent- faculty and parent -administration interaction. Through counseling at the time of admission and through orientation programme with the whole university before admissions, we facilitate parent and student interactions with the university staff, teaching and non-teaching. This enhances familiarity and comfort between both the sides, parents-students and university. The offices of VC and Registrar are open for student interaction and feedback. The students can meet either of the authority by going to their offices and requesting a meeting. Even parents can access the authorities and the faculty through these offices for interaction through phone, or meeting through appointments, or over mail. The Parents are regularly informed of their ward's attendance and academic performance. The attendance of students is marked on the TCS-ion platform. 7.2 – Best Practices

7.2.1 – Describe at least two institutional best practices

1. Creating a peaceful and inclusive campus environment National Law University Delhi values a comprehensive, holistic, socially relevant and interdisciplinary legal education which prepares the students for the ground realities of the world. The University is a residential campus wherein students and faculty from various parts of the country as well as the world study and live together. It becomes essential to promote harmony and make the campus an inclusive space. Apart from the usual dynamics, there are several different cultural, linguistic, regional, communal, socio-economic diversities at play on the campus that needs to be addressed. Through this type of education, we aim to promote legal and ethical values and foster the rule of law and the objectives enshrined in the Constitution of India, striving to achieve political, social and economic justice. We strongly believe that we must create awareness about rights and entitlements and eliminate oppression, exploitation of the weaker, marginalized and poorer sections of the society, and thereby we reach out to such communities through various measures and initiatives. The Practice: The University has constituted various committees including the Equal Opportunities Cell (EOC), SC/ST Cell and Social Inclusion Committee - all working towards ensuring creation of an inclusive space within the University. The EOC provides

information and acts as a counselling-cum-guidance centre for students belonging to the marginalized sections, especially with regard to academic, financial and other matters. Thereby, creating and fostering a holistic and socially conducive atmosphere for the growth of healthy interpersonal relations among students from the marginalized sections and from various social backgrounds. This is to help them in developing cordial interpersonal relationships between teachers and students for academic interaction and extracurricular activities. It aims to extend help/ support to the students from marginalized sections to overcome problems and barriers emanating from discrimination at any level within its mandate. The committee comprises of both faculty members and students. The SC/ST Cell mandated by the UGC Guidelines among many things also function as a Grievances Redressal Cell for the grievances of SC/ST students and employees of the university and render them necessary help in solving their academic as well as administrative problems. The Social Inclusion Committee is a student body committee with a faculty advisor, which work towards addressing various issues faced by different communities within the campus. Evidence of Success: With the induction of new batches every academic year, a set of students with a different demographic join with various interests and identities. Recently the University has been able to increase the number of enrolment of students in the B.A.LL.B. course due to this increasing co-ordination and co-operation among the student fraternity as well as the faculty and staff. Further, this practice of encouraging inclusivity led various student-initiated bodies like APPSC and Social Inclusion Committee, composed by the students themselves. These committees in place have been able to address several areas of concern as well as have raised awareness regarding the same. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: Instilling caste and class sensitivity is an area that these practices tend to focus on the most, considering the deep-rooted prejudices and stereotypes the society has perpetuated among individuals. Thereby emphasis is given to sensitization workshops, talks and discussion. https://nludelhi.ac.in/qick-notification.aspx 2. Clean and Green Campus

Objectives of the Practice: The objectives the University endeavours to achieve through this practice are: a) create an eco-friendly environment in campus b) to increase the overall health of students c) to instil community sense/skills and environment-friendly behaviour among the students d) to reduce pollution by minimizing waste within the campus e) to improve air quality, and reduce energy and water use f) to achieve environmental and economic sustainability g) for overall improved quality of life on campus. The Context: In National Law University Delhi, we believe that development can go hand in hand with the preservation of nature. This ideology reflects almost all the measures adopted by the University. Located in a prime location of Dwarka, New Delhi, occasionally known for its high pollution levels, it becomes all the more

important to take steps towards creating a healthy and safe environment for the students, faculty and staff. In addition, the University believes adopting ecofriendly practices can set an example to higher education institutes around the country. The Practice: The campus has a contemporary, yet eco-friendly infrastructure and green ambience. The greenery and the well-maintained campus

are a striking feature of the University from the very first sight. Simultaneously the University is equipped with both modern technologies and environmentally friendly practices. As of 2018, the campus is fully airconditioned and yet it is pollution-free and follows a clean and green ecofriendly outlook. With its clean surroundings and green atmosphere, there is maximum coverage with greenery having over 10,000 potted plants. Upkeep of plantation, potted plants, and overall maintenance is done on a daily basis.

There is dedicated and designated staffs who work around the clock and resources have been assigned to duties related to different types and areas of cleanliness, courtesy of the campus being residential. Due to which regular sanitation and fumigation of washrooms, kitchens, classrooms, etc. are done

with regularity. Pest control and anti-mosquito fogging are done every fortnightly to maintain the university insect-free. Everyone at the university is sensitized to environment-friendly behaviour, and the management has installed various eco-friendly preservation and conservation machinery and mechanisms. Solar power is used in the hostels to supply hot water to students during winters. The infrastructure is carefully curated by stationing plants, buildings, and pathways that push any excess rainwater away from the walking passage. Running water is available 24x7 on campus, while three rainwater harvesting systems are also in place to save water. 40 water purifiers and coolers are available at every point of the University for providing clean drinkable water. All across the campus colour coded garbage disposal bins facilitates segregation between biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste disposal. Garbage segregation and disposal is of special concern and solid waste collection and disposal has been assigned on a daily basis to the housekeeping staff and to the SDMC. Constant monitoring of the campus is done according to seasonal changes and requirements. Biodiversity is noticeable in the campus, with birds, butterflies, and stray dogs adopted by the university. Evidence of Success: One of the greatest achievements in terms of maintaining a green and clean environment within the campus for National Law University Delhi is being ranked Third (3rd) cleanest Higher Educational Institutions in the country in Swachh Campus Ranking 2019 by Ministry of Human Resource Development. The campus also observes increased productivity among students, faculty and staff due to the positive environment created due to these measures and practices. Problems Encountered and Resources Required: There are

disadvantages due to the location at times, due to the increase in pollution levels during certain periods. However, the University tries its best to not contribute to the same and maintain its environment-friendly measures and practices all throughout the year.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 – Provide the details of the performance of the institution in one area distinctive to its vision, priority and thrust in not more than 500 words

The National Law University Delhi was established in 2008 by Act No. 1 of 2008 with the vision to evolve and impart comprehensive, interdisciplinary and socially relevant legal education. It has attempted to do this by encouraging active and high-quality research by the faculty members, in the conviction that teaching and research are mutually reinforcing concepts. As a result, National Law University Delhi has established a robust research ecosystem that interacts with and contributes directly to development of law and policy in various areas of law both nationally and internationally. As part of this initiative four endowment chairs and various research centres have been established focusing on innovative research spanning a range of legal concerns including death penalty, mental health of prisoners, open access, education and gender, corporate governance, sustainable development, law and technology, etc. These research projects have yielded significant results in the form of release of incarcerated death row inmates, contribution to open access discussions, mainstreaming of mental health concerns of prisoners, inclusion of victim jurisprudence within criminal law and policy discussions, auditing corporate social responsibility initiatives, securing of access to justice through right

to information, working closely with marginalised and vulnerable sections of the society to secure their access to governmental programmes, to name a few.

Its research capacity has also been strengthened through the receipt of research grants from a range of funders including the Ministry of Human Resource Development (SPARC), Ministry of Law and Justice, European Union, UNDP, Qualcomm Inc., etc. Student involvement in various research projects facilitates young budding lawyer-students to think critically, become well conversant with legal principles and enables them to view and practice law from a holistic perspective. All centres actively encourage and involve student participation in various stages of the research, including in field work. Such involvement provides students with an invaluable opportunity to obtain a firsthand view of the real life situations and challenges faced by various marginalised sections of the society. It further enables them to understand and engage critically with the working of the law, and provides them with a substantive means to bring about a meaningful change using law as an instrument of social transformation. NLUD encourages its students to utilise their legal knowledge and skills for community betterment. Opportunities to engage with local community to meet their legal aid needs are made available to through the University's Legal Service Committee, Clinic for Assistance in Labour Laws, Mohalla Clinics and Pro Bono Panel. NLUD has strengthened its academic, research and industry collaborations consistently over the years. These collaborations have resulted in cutting edge research and innovative outcomes such as the IP Startups project that is expected to contribute substantially to the innovation landscape in India by highlighting the relevance of IP for startups in India and the development of L2Pro IP e-learning Platform. NLUD has also entered into MoUs with international and national academic institutions to facilitate exchange of faculty and students. Currently NLUD published four high quality academic journals.

8. Future Plans of Actions for Next Academic Year

National Law University Delhi has been adopting several initiatives to improve its academic and research activities. The developments and improvements envisaged by it over the course of the next academic year are the following: Increased efforts would be made to strengthen existing research ecosystem in the University. This would include provision of greater financial and material support to various Research Centres at NLUD to expand and upgrade their research capacities and capabilities. Establishment of research centres focusing on issues of social justice are also in the pipeline. Additionally, four endowment chairs, namely KL Arora Chair in Criminal Law, Justice Bodhraj Sawney Chair on Professional Ethics, Chair on Consumer Laws (Ministry of Consumer Affairs) and DPIIT IPR Chair have been instituted to support and bolster research efforts at NLUD by focussing on generation of relevant and impactful research. The university is endeavouring to establish more chairs to facilitate research and policy work. To assist in its efforts to review and upgrade its research endeavours NLUD has established the Academic and Research Planning Department, and the Research and Development Committee which is mandated to chart efforts and steps necessary to strengthen research culture in the University. In addition to their research mandates, all research centres are in the process of formulating and offering industry relevant courses and training programmes both to government officials and members of the general public. The university is focussing on internationalization of campus including new and innovative curriculum and bringing more foreign faculty and foreign students for its programmes. Steps in this regard have already been taken by the university by registering for students through Study In India- EDCIL Programme and Indian Council for Cultural Relations. The University has an impressive teacher-student ratio, which it would focus on maintaining even though its intake of students for both the undergraduate and post graduate programme has substantially increased. As a

residential University all students stay on campus, therefore to accommodate the growing NLUD fraternity, expansion of University infrastructure would be undertaken. In equal measure institutional plans and strategies are being deliberated upon to efficiently deploy and upgrade existing IT infrastructure and associated facilities. This is undertaken with a view of strengthening both synchronous and asynchronous teaching and learning capabilities. In the coming year the University intends to invest
