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

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# PREFACE

Access to justice is not limited to the presence of courts, laws, and procedures. It also requires awareness, understanding, and the ability of people to assert their rights meaningfully. Far too often, however, laws remain locked in technical language, hidden away in statutes, or confined to the knowledge of legal professionals. For citizens, particularly those who are marginalized or vulnerable, the very instruments meant to protect them become inaccessible.

This book is a modest but purposeful effort to bridge that gap. By using infographics and posters, it seeks to make the law visible, approachable, and comprehensible. Visual communication has the unique ability to simplify complexity, and in the context of law, it enables rights and responsibilities to be conveyed in a manner that is both clear and memorable. The hope is that through these visuals, citizens can recognize the protections guaranteed to them, and feel empowered to claim and exercise those rights.

The book is organized thematically, covering a wide range of rights and protections that are foundational to democracy, equality, and human dignity.

In the book, Minorities' Rights are explained as safeguards of pluralism, essential for India's democratic fabric. Rights of Elderly Persons are explained through provisions on maintenance, welfare, and protection from abuse, reflecting society's duty of care towards its senior citizens. Women's Rights occupy an important space, covering protections against dowry, domestic violence, sexual offences, discriminatory practices, and laws relating to equal pay and the termination of pregnancy. This section emphasizes that gender justice remains central to social justice. Equally important are pathways to justice: legal services, family courts, and mediation, which bring the law closer to people in practical, accessible ways. In recent years, recognition of Transgender Rights has marked a significant step toward inclusivity. The posters in this section highlight dignity, equality, and the right to live free from stigma. The book also includes rights of persons with disabilities, consumer rights, and the Right to Information, each vital for ensuring inclusivity, accountability, and fairness in daily life.

The Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes (Prevention of Atrocities) Act and the PESA Act remind us of the unfinished journey toward social equality, aimed at dismantling discrimination and enabling self-determination.

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
